required to vote in
the 2011 elections.

If you were convicted of a **FELONY** and as of Election Day you are “**off paper**,” in other words **NOT**

- **Incarcerated** • **On Probation** • **On Parole**, or
- **On Extended Supervision...**

YOU CAN VOTE!

**ONCE YOU HAVE COMPLETED YOUR FELONY SENTENCE,
YOU CAN REGISTER TO VOTE.**

If you were convicted of a **MISDEMEANOR**, you **never** lose your right to vote, but if you're in jail on Election Day, you have to vote by absentee ballot.

Vote to empower yourself, your family and your community. Vote so the needs of your community are met by those in office. Vote because your voice is important and deserves to be heard!
