## **VOTING IN WISCONSIN AFTER A CRIMINAL CONVICTION**

## IF YOU...

Were convicted of a felony and you are "off paper" (you aren't on parole/probation/ extended supervision)



If you are in jail on Election Day but have not yet been convicted or pled guilty



If you are in jail on Election Day because of a misdemeanor sentence



If you were convicted of a misdemeanor and are not in jail



If you are in prison, or on probation, on parole or supervision for a felony or misdemeanor bribery/treason



## **HOW TO VOTE**

You need to register — there are several ways to do this, including at your polling place on Election Day with proof of residence — and you need to have photo ID, and then you can vote.

Register, and vote by absentee ballot. You must send a request for an absentee ballot to your municipal clerk, along with a copy of your photo ID unless they already have it on file.

(There are some deadlines.)
