VOTING IN WISCONSIN AFTER A CRIMINAL CONVICTION

IF YOU	HOW TO VOTE
Were convicted of a felony and you are "off paper" (you aren't on parole/probation/ extended supervision)	You need to register (there are several ways to do this, including at your polling place on Election Day with proof of residence), and you need to have photo ID, and then you can vote.
If you are in jail on Election Day but have not yet been convicted or pled guilty	Register, and vote by absentee ballot. You have to ask for an absentee ballot from the clerk where you live. (There are some deadlines.)
If you are in jail on Election Day because of a misdemeanor sentence	Register, and vote by absentee ballot. You have to ask for an absentee ballot from the clerk where you live. (There are some deadlines.)
If you were convicted of a misdemeanor and are not in jail	You need to register (there are several ways to do this, including at your polling place on Election Day with proof of residence), and you need to have photo ID, and then you can vote.
If you are in prison, or on probation, on parole or supervision for a felony or misdemeanor bribery/treason	There are other ways you can engage in your community. Visit aclu-wi.org to learn more.
