November 3rd Election Education Resources

Thank you for checking out this resource! 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Overview

Following is an overview of the images and guidance provided throughout this toolkit. These are the key elements of any election, and have been adapted to include information specific to the upcoming election on November 3rd.

Proof of Residence (POR)

This refers to a document that proves where you live, which is required when registering to vote. You can find more information about POR using <u>this guidance</u> from the Wisconsin Elections Commission. This messaging is important to share throughout the entire election cycle.

Online Voter Registration

If you choose to register to vote online, the most convenient way to do so is by visiting <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>. Wisconsin voters can typically register online for any election up until 20 days prior to Election Days. For the November 3rd election, this option ends October 14th.

In-Person Voter Registration

If you choose to register in person, you may do so at either a designated early voting site, at your municipal clerk's office, or at your polling place on election day, so long as you have lived at your place of residence for at least 28 days by Election Day. You can find your polling place at <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>. This information is important to share throughout the entire election cycle, but should be framed differently depending on the date.

Photo ID

To receive your ballot, you will need to provide photo identification. The most common type of photo ID to use for voting is a Wisconsin driver's license or State-issued ID card. Visit <u>bringit.wi.gov</u> for other options. Please note that you can retrieve a free Photo ID for voting from any Wisconsin DMV, even if you do not have official documents such as a birth certificate. It is best to secure an ID for voting very early in the voting planning process. This information is important to share throughout the entire election cycle.

Absentee Voting

This is also commonly refereed to as "Voting Absentee By Mail" or "Voting By Mail". This option is available to all eligible voters in Wisconsin, and allows someone to cast their ballot without going their polling place on election day. To request an absentee ballot, visit <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>. Your ballot must be received by 8pm on election night. For options on ways to ensure you can return your ballot by the deadline, visit <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>. For the November 3rd election, the official deadline to request an absentee ballot is October 29th. However, we strongly encourage individuals to make the request by October 14th.

Early Voting

This is also commonly referred to as "In Person Absentee Voting". In many municipalities, this option is available two weeks before the election for individuals who would like to vote in-person, but are not able / choose not to vote at the polls on election day. Visit <u>myvote.wi.gov</u> to find more details on early voting options near you. For the November 3rd election, early voting begins in many municipalities on October 20th.

Election Day Voting

Several elections may occur throughout any given year, and when you show up to cast your ballot in these elections, you are participating in Election Day Voting. You can find all the information you need to prepare for the next Election day, including the date, your local polling place, what's on your ballot, and your municipal clerk's information at <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>. The next Election Day is Tuesday, November 3rd.

Problems at the Polls

If you experience or observe any problems at the polls, especially those that may hinder voters from being able to both cast their ballot and have it counted in timely manner, please report those problems to the Election Protection Hotline, which can be reached at 866-OUR-VOTE. The hotline is also open to taking questions and offering help any time preceding Election Days. Lastly, keep an eye out for voter experience surveys distributed by trusted nonpartisan organizations like The League of Women Voters. Completing these surveys helps to inform the work and policy priorities of voting rights organizations and advocates. This information is important to share throughout the entire election cycle.

Become a Poll Worker

Poll workers are the cornerstone of our democracy - responsible for registering voters, distributing ballots, making sure those ballots are counted, and handing out the cherished "I Voted" stickers. Our democracy depends on thousands of ordinary people who offer their time to serve in this role, but we are facing an unprecedented shortage due to COVID-19. - Registering to vote? Don't forget your proof of residence! Head to <u>https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/ProofofResidence</u> for options.
- Up until October 14, you can use your driver's license or Wisconsin ID to register to vote at <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>. You can also register on Election Day (November 3rd) at the polls!
- Missed the deadline to register to vote online? No worries! You can always register at the poll on Election Day. Make sure to bring your proof of residence. <u>https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/ProofofResidence</u>
- If you register to vote by mail, in-person in your clerk's office, or at your polling place on Election Day, you need to provide a Proof of Residence document. In addition to a valid State of Wisconsin driver license or state ID card with the voter's current address, other documents may be used as proof of residence for registering. Some examples are a current utility bill, lease, a paycheck or paystub, a university ID card or other official document showing the voter's name and current address. - There are many ways to prove your residence when registering to vote! Some examples:
 - ✓ A current and valid (unexpired and not suspended or revoked) Wisconsin driver license or Wisconsin state ID card with the voter's current name and address
 - ✓ Fishing and hunting licenses
 - ✓ Vehicle registrations
 - ✓ Food stamps, Wisconsin Works, Wisconsin Shares, and BadgerCare notices and correspondence
 - ✓ Medicare notices and Medicare Explanation of Benefits (not from 2nd party providers or other health insurance providers)
 - ✓ Social Security and SSI notices and benefits statements
 - Public high school, technical college, and public university correspondence and documents, including: admissions correspondence, financial aid notices, report cards, and schedules
 - ✓ Federal student loan correspondence and notices
 - ✓ Billing statements and collection notices from a governmental entity
 - ✓ Correspondence from a federally recognized Native American Tribe living in Wisconsin

Online Voter Registration

If you choose to register to vote online, the most convenient way to do so is by visiting <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>. Wisconsin voters can typically register online for any election up until 20 days prior to Election Days. For the November 3rd election, OVR ends October 14th.

- THREAD:
 - You have to REGISTER if you've never voted in WI before, you've moved since the last time you voted, or you changed your name. https://myvote.wi.gov/en-US/RegisterToVote
 - 2. You also have to REGISTER if you haven't voted in at least four years or if your voting rights were restored after a felony conviction.

- [To use after October 14th] Missed the deadline to register to vote online? No worries! You can likely still register to vote at your municipal clerk's office, or at your polling place on election day. Visit <u>myvote.wi.gov</u> for more information.
- [To use on November 3rd] It's Election Day! Still need to register to vote? You can register at your polling place, just remember to bring an acceptable proof of residence. Head to https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/ProofofResidence for options.

Photo ID

To receive your ballot, you will need to provide photo identification. The most common type of photo ID to use for voting is a Wisconsin driver's license or State-issued ID card. - No driver's license or Wisconsin ID? Visit <u>bringit.wi.gov</u> for other options.
- Need help getting a driver's license or Wisconsin ID to vote? Call 608-285-2141 for help from nonpartisan Wisconsin volunteers.
- Need a WI driver's license or State-issued photo ID card with which to vote? You can get a free photo for voting at a DMV near you even if you don't have a birth certificate or other documents. Visit <u>bringit.wi.gov</u> for more info.
- Bring your Acceptable Photo ID to vote (for example, a current Wisconsin Drivers License or State ID). For other options, visit <u>bringit.wi.gov</u>
- You are required to show a photo ID before you vote. This can include a Wisconsin-issued driver's license/ID card, or many other kinds of IDs. For more information: bringit.wi.gov
- You must have an Acceptable Photo ID to vote, such as a current Wisconsin Driver's License or State ID. Bring It to the Ballot has a list of acceptable Photo IDs: bringit.wi.gov
- There are many useful options for acceptable identification when voting. The list includes Wisconsin Driver's Licenses and State ID cards, Military IDs and Veteren Affairs Cards, Some Student IDs from Wisconsin Accredited colleges, Wisconsin Tribal IDs and Certificates of Naturalization, US Passports, and even some DMV receipts! - Problems at the polls? Call 866-OUR-VOTE for support from nonpartisan election protection volunteers.
- If you are in line to vote by 8pm, you have a right to cast your ballot. In the event anyone challenges that right, call 866-OUR-VOTE.
- When you vote at the polls, you will be asked to provide a photo ID in order to cast your ballot. This may be your driver's license, or one of many other options. The address on your photo ID does not need to be current. If someone challenges you on this, call 866-OUR-VOTE.
- If you use a provisional ballot to vote, you must provide the additional required information to your poll workers by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day or the municipal clerk by 4:00 p.m. of the Friday following the election. With questions, call 866-OUR-VOTE.
- Voters with disabilities: You have the right to an accessible polling place. This includes the right to use an accessible voting machine, to assistance marking your ballot, and to voting curbside. Questions? Call the Disability Rights Wisconsin Voter Hotline at 1-844-347-8683.
- Any voter, regardless of whether he or she is able to read, write or speak English or is blind or otherwise physically disabled, has the right to receive help voting from a person of his or her choice except for the voter's employer, an agent of the voter's employer, or an officer or agent of the voter's union.
- Did you make a mistake on your ballot? You have the right to not cast that ballot and receive a replacement ballot. Questions? Call 866-OUR-VOTE.
